WHEREAS, a tornado in Aitkin County on June 12th has caused destruction of trees, power supply systems, and buildings

WHEREAS, Mille Lacs Energy and Farm Island Township has neither the manpower or resources needed to do the repairs and debris cleanup on all of the effected sites immediately

WHEREAS, the damage caused by these storms is excessive in cost

THEREFORE, the Aitkin County Board of Commissioners **FINDS** as follows:

1. That a state of emergency exists within Aitkin County, arising from the tornados destruction of power supply systems, buildings and debris clean up
2. That the public health, safety, and welfare would suffer by the delay to perform needed repairs to the power supply systems, and buildings

THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, this 25th day of June, 2024, by the Aitkin County Board of Commissioners, that Aitkin County declare emergency until the completion of these repairs to roads, buildings, and power supply systems.

Dear Governor Walz:

Due to a severe weather outbreak on June 12, 2024, which spawned one confirmed tornado touchdown, and possibly a second unconfirmed tornado, damages across sections of the County have impacted Aitkin County. This tornado has caused damages to County and township infrastructure as well as private structures in Aitkin County.

Aitkin County submitted a Damage and Impact Assessment Report to the Minnesota Department of Public Safety, Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM), which indicated tornado related damages in excess of the Aitkin County State threshold. As a result of our initial damage estimates Aitkin County requested HSEM to conduct a State Preliminary Damage Assessment (PDA).

Aitkin County is requesting state disaster assistance in accordance with Minnesota Statute 12B.30, pending the outcome from the results of the PDA and County Board approval.

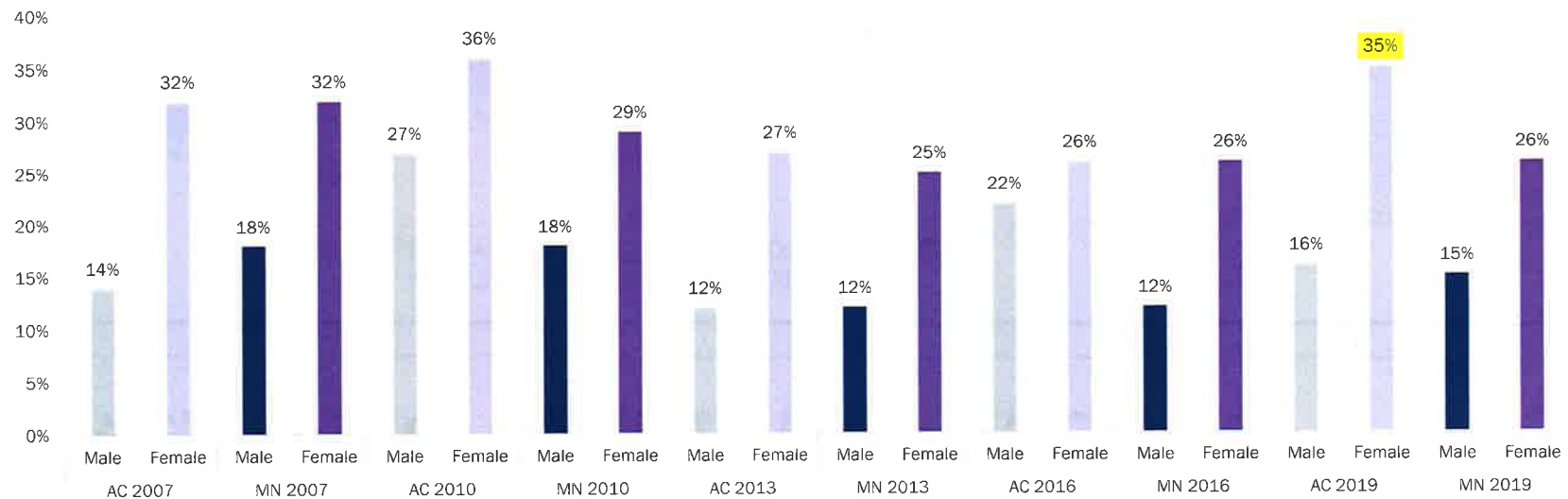

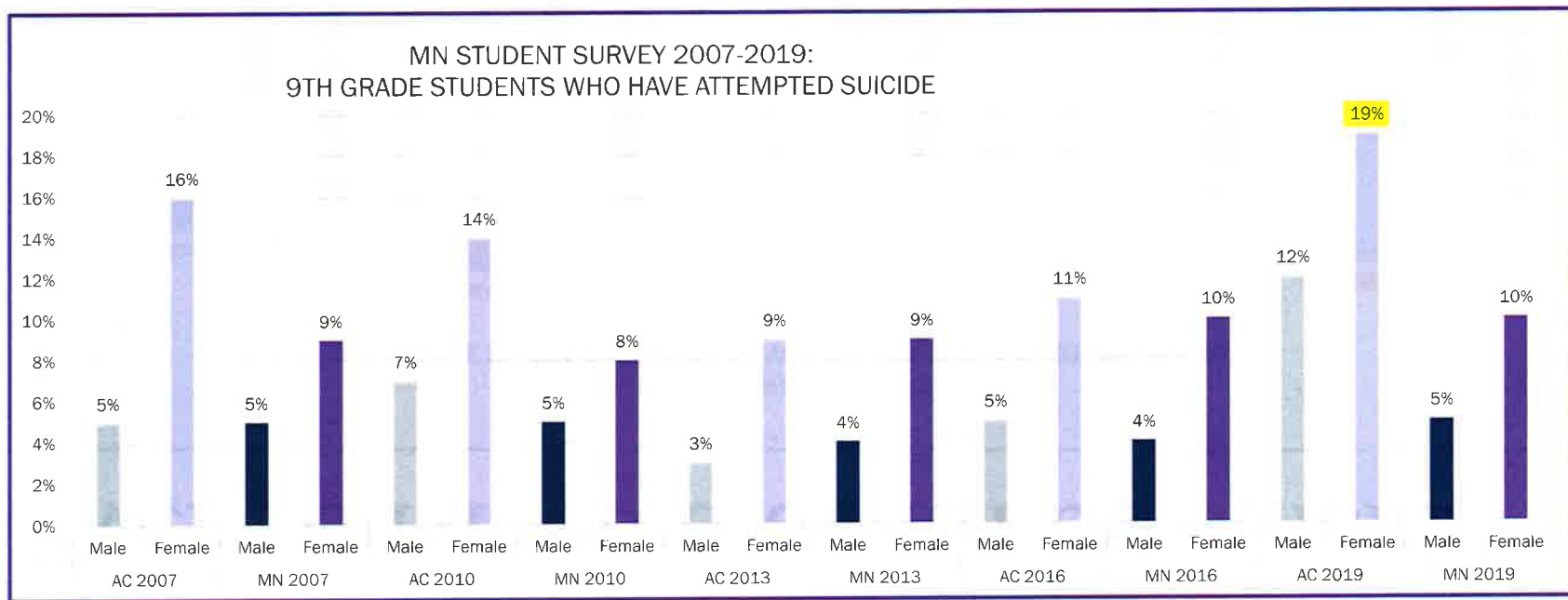

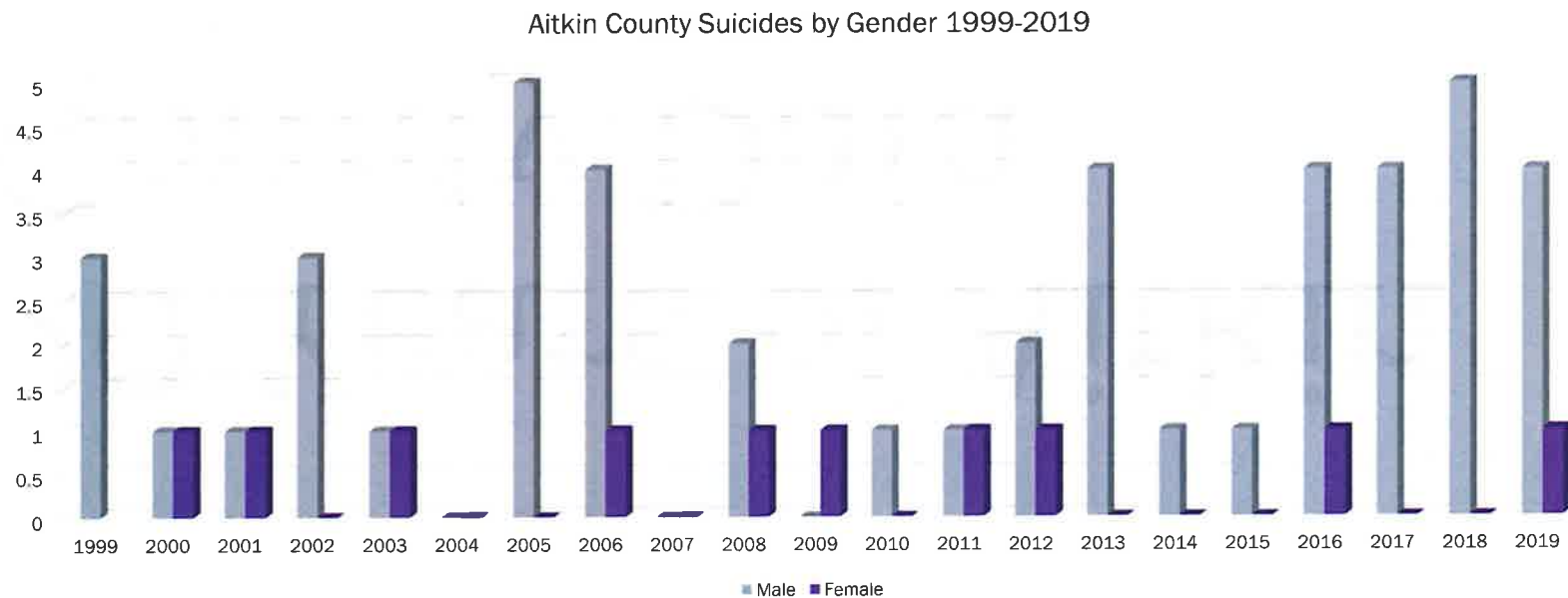

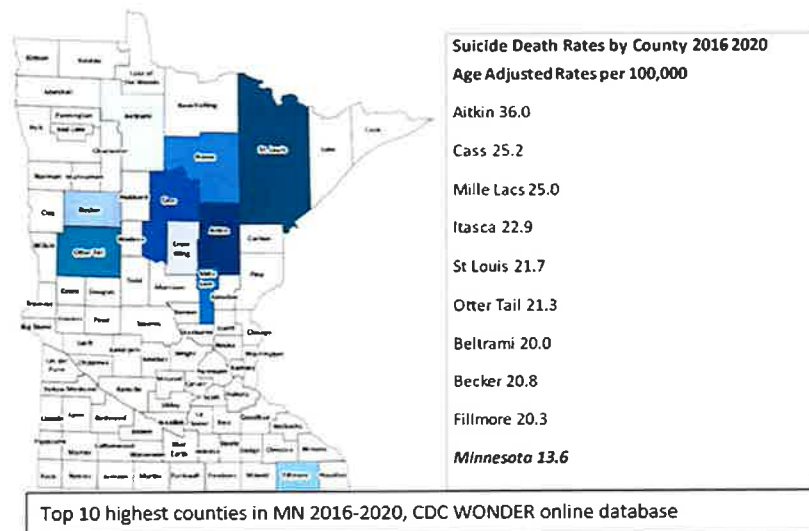

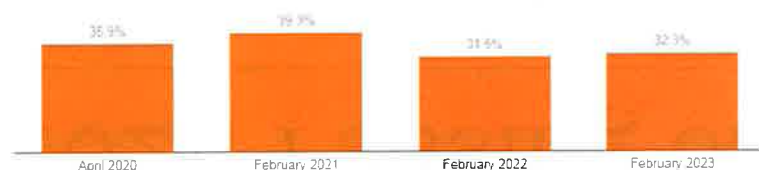

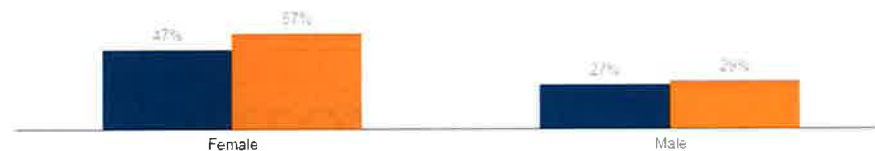

5 points from the 2023 COUNTY FAIR



- Most respondents reported that they **knew the symptoms of anxiety, depression, & bipolar disorder**. Less than half of respondents felt that they knew the symptoms of **PTSD and schizophrenia**.

Lived Experience:

- 4/5 of respondents reported that they knew how to **access crisis services**. 2/3 reported that they knew how to **find a therapist**. Less than 1/2 reported that they knew how to **get services for their child**.
- The majority of participants cited the following as barriers most of the time: Needed services don't exist. Wait time for services. Cost of services. Hours of availability.
- Most respondents also reported these barriers **occurring occasionally**: Not meeting the **qualifications** (enrollment process). Greater success receiving/accessing services when a **practitioner calls** with or on my behalf.
- Respondents indicated that the largest gaps in services were inpatient mental health services and psychiatric providers.

Public Comment Talking Points for Aitkin County Board Meeting

Mr. Chairman and commissioners, my name is Anita Klennert-Sonaglia. I am the owner of Klennert Stores, Inc. DBA: Roadside Market & Sunny's located in Hill City, MN.

Our stores have been in operation since 1979 & 1996. We have 33 employees who rely on their jobs to support themselves and their families.

I was not in attendance when this law was discussed. I appreciate your concern for children, but I do not see this as any sort of solution to your problem. I see it as an unfair attack on businesses in Aitkin County. The simple fact it does not apply to businesses inside the city of Aitkin, is extremely disturbing and disrespectful in regards to your research efforts. It demonstrates complete neglect for the businesses you should be supporting and representing.

Roadside Market is located 2.5 miles from the Aitkin/Itasca County line. (Sunny's is 3 miles). All rules limiting tobacco in Aitkin County will generate an influx of sales in Grand Rapids! Aitkin County will be generating income for Itasca County by pushing sales into Grand Rapids.

Adult tobacco users know what they want! Adults in the Hill City area will drive the 14.5 miles to purchase the tobacco they desire. If a customer is driving to purchase tobacco, they will ALSO purchase; alcohol, bait, license, sporting goods, groceries, and other outdoor items at the same time. The Pokegama Lake Store is only 14 miles away, Walmart, Target and Super One are all within 15 miles. **The competition to survive while being located this close is a constant battle and you will shut down my business by giving Itasca County the advantage.**

The Hill City School District pulls students in from Itasca County! Students are entering from Itasca County daily. Tobacco access will not be controlled by drawing a line 2.5 miles from another county. Our busses transport students in and out of Itasca County! I do not know your ages, but I am assuming you can all relate to this model abused with Alcohol in the 80's... Everyone drove to Wisconsin (1.5 hours away) to purchase alcohol because it was legal. Implementing a law and asking people to drive 15 minutes to Grand Rapids is not going to solve your problem.

Drawing a line just pushes business outside the line and encourages creativity in children to obtain the product, it does not prevent it.

The current condition of the economy, the massive change in labor laws, including medical insurance and paid time off is making it impossible to survive as a small business. The road closures have cut our business in ½ this year to date. The lack of a winter season in combination with the other factors has put us into a state of survival. I am considering layoffs and closures without this new rule, this change will just put the nail in the coffin. Aitkin county should be assisting businesses, helping to building them, encouraging survival and productivity, not forcing them into survival mode because the structure of accountability is damaged.

If you spend any time in Northern Aitkin County, you know the immediate danger for children is not a federally regulated flavored tobacco product. It is a range of meth, marijuana, and other drugs available at any time to children and adults. The ease to purchase anything uncontrolled off the street is so concerning.

I do not know the solution to the problem. **Forcing a law to show the public you acknowledge the problem is not the same as solving the problem.** This flavored tobacco problem will not be solved at the county level, or anywhere we draw boarder around a community. A line in the sand will always be crossed.

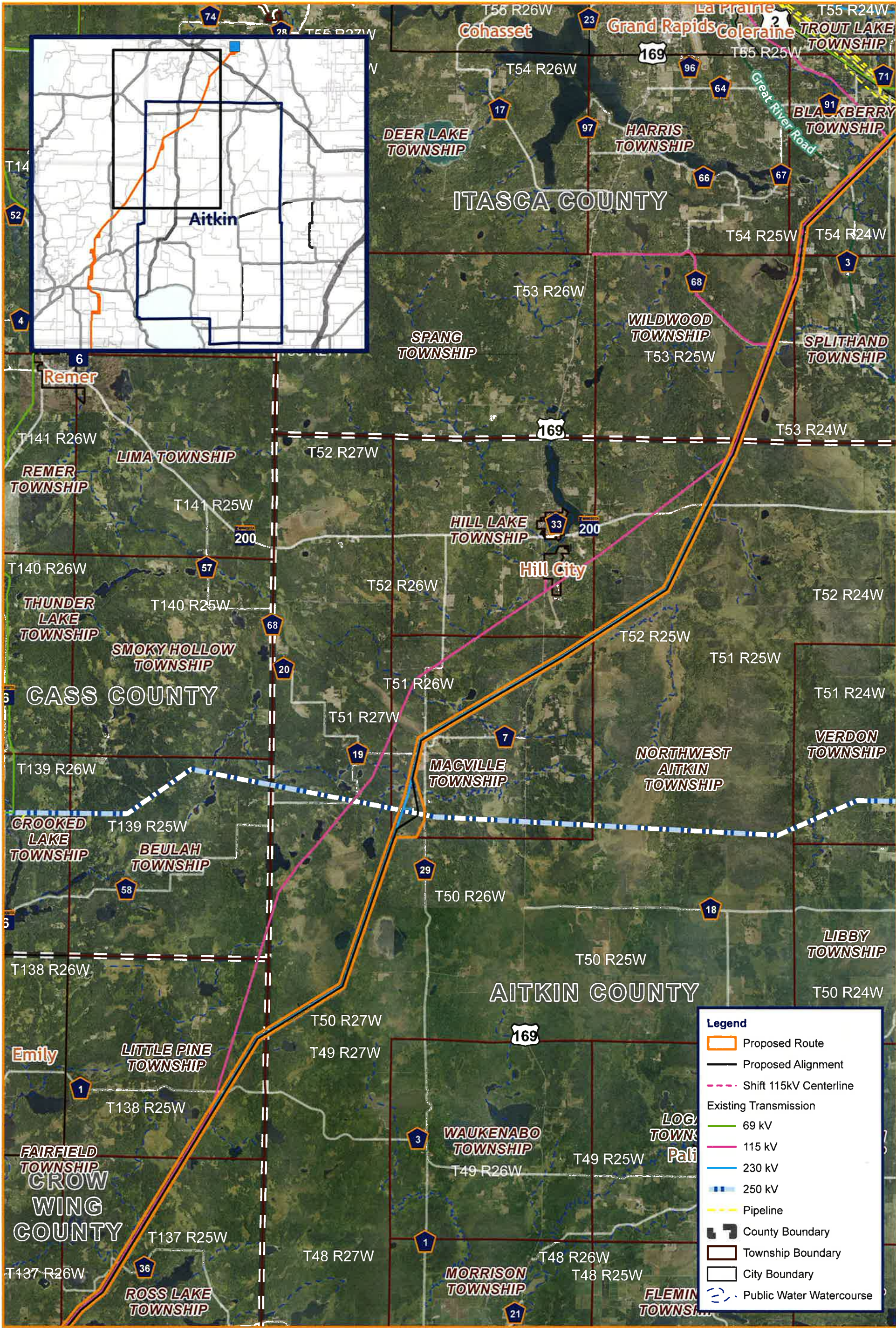
Of all the dangers and drugs available to children right on the dirt roads in Aitkin County, a federally regulated product seems like the lesser of the alternatives. Children are creative and will find a way to experiment, lets hope they do not lean into something more dangerous.

I apologize I do not have a solution for your problem. I do know movement to help protect the children needs to empower communities not suffocate them. Damaging businesses, taking away simple freedoms from law abiding adults does not encourage positivity. It has already created an overwhelming demonstration of disappointment with government control and rebuttal. When local communities learned of the new law there was a wave of negative emotion and rage for loss of something they have the right to choose. Rebuttal and negative environments are the only thing you are creating while damaging businesses in Aitkin County and providing income for surrounding counties.

I hope you will all take the time to revisit your rulings and search for an alternative. A line in the sand does not solve this problem. We need to come together as communities and families, we need movements of positivity, waves of solutions from a variety of members at all levels.

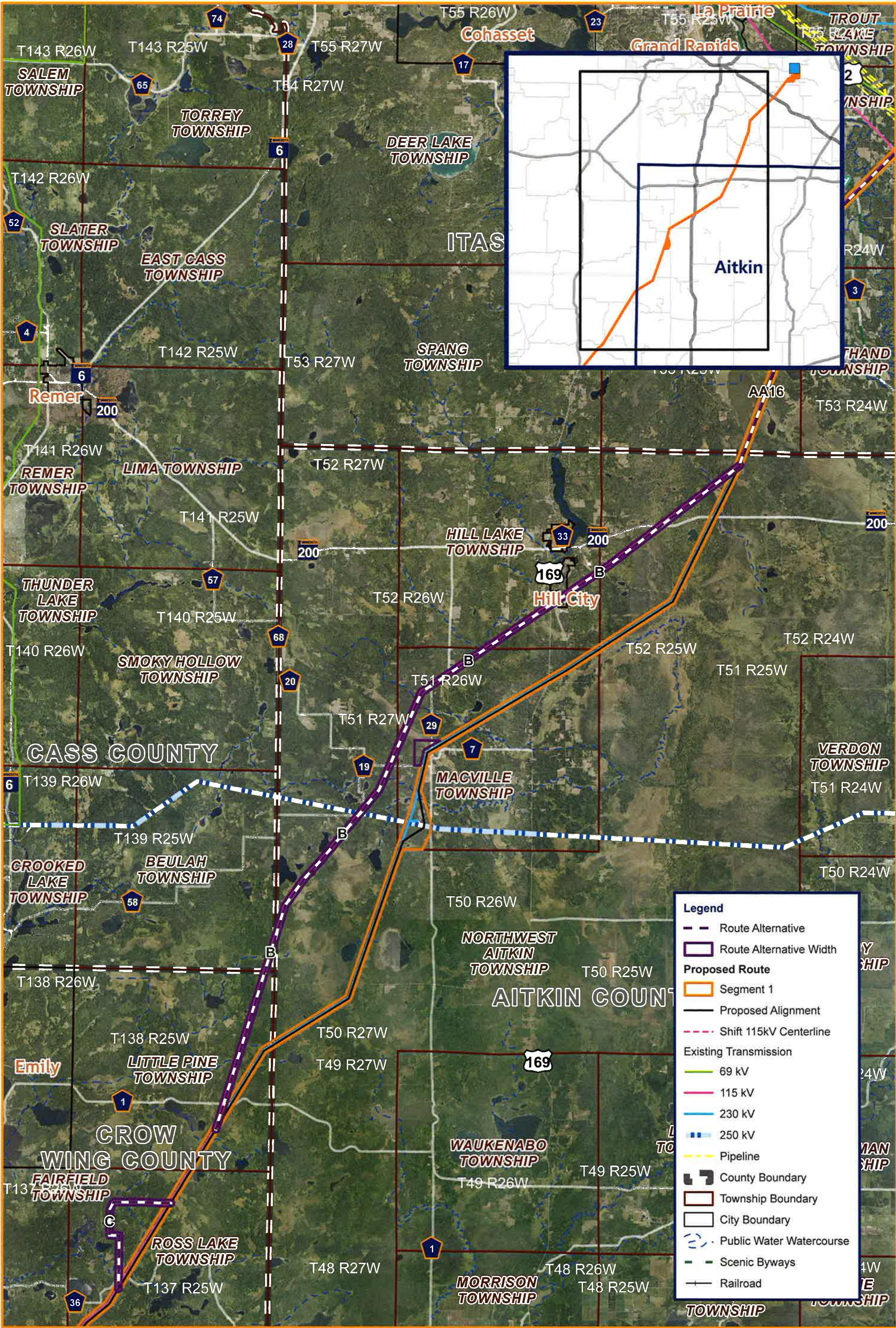
