Palisade Fire Department Agreement of Fire Protection

This Agreement Made and entered into this 17th day of October 2025 by and between the city of Palisade, a Municipal corporation of Aitkin County, MN and <u>Aitkin County Unorganized Townships 49-27, 50-25, 50-26, 50-27, 51-25.</u>

WHEREAS, the second party, deeming it advisable to have available for the benefit of the residents said Township, service of the first parties Fire Department, and the Electors of said Town having pursuant to law, provided a fund for furnishing of said service and WHEREAS, the first party has by appropriate action authorized its Mayor and Council Members to enter into a contract with the second party for furnishing of said service. NOW, THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed between the parties hereto, that for a period of ONE YEAR from and after the date hereof, the FIRE DEPARTMENT of the first party will answer any and all fire calls of the residents in the following <u>Aitkin County Unorganized Townships</u> and will respond to such calls with suitable firefighting apparatus manned by at least three members of the Palisade Fire Department, who will render all assistance possible in the saving of life and property. In consideration of said service, second party agrees to pay as following;

<u>49-27 \$5718.79</u>: <u>50-25 \$1761.13</u>: <u>50-26 \$1,762.39</u>: <u>50-27 \$376.50</u>: <u>51-25 \$320.09</u> = <u>\$9,938.90</u>.

The amount of \$9,938.90 due and payable by November 30th, 2025.

It is understood and agreed however, that at times weather and road conditions through the various seasons of the year can and no doubt will interfere in the rendering of such service, in which event, failure to furnish the service herein agreed upon, shall not be taken to be a breach of this agreement.

It is further agreed that this contract shall continue to be in effect for a period of not more than ten years with the privilege of canceling by either party with a written notice within 30 days. Late fees of 1.5% of total agreement will be assessed monthly after due date of November 30th, 2025.

CONTRACT DATE: JANUARY 1, 2026 to DECEMBER 31, 2026.

This agreement made and entered into by and between the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department, in the Township of Ball Bluff, in the County of Aitkin in the State of Minnesota and the Townships of 51-22, 52-22, 52-24, a township of the County of Aitkin in the State of Minnesota.

WHEREAS, the Townships of 51-22, 52-22, 52-24 desires the services of the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department in case of fires occurring in 51-22, 52-22, 52-24 Townships as well as the emergency medical services of the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department 1st Responders in case of a medical emergency, and

WHEREAS, the Township of Ball Bluff maintains a volunteer fire department with emergency medical response capability, which department is available to provide fire protection and emergency medical response services to properties located in the Townships of 51-22, 52-22, 52-24, and

THEREFORE, it is agreed by and between said parties as follows:

- 1. The Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department shall provide fire protection and emergency medical response services to those properties in 51-22, 52-22, 52-24 Township lying within the areas outlined in red on the attached map. Such fire protection and emergency medical response services shall be provided from **January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026** with the existing and any newly-obtained fire, medical equipment, apparatus and with members of the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department.
- 2. Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department agrees to provide fire protection and emergency medical response services as described above to 51-22, 52-22, 52-24 Township in exchange for payment of the portion of the budget that would be equal to the portion of 51-22, 52-22, 52-24's tax capacity in relation to the tax capacity of the fire departments total coverage area. The portions are as follows 51-22 \$11,621.29, 52-22 \$3,463.49, 52-24 \$609.68, which will provide coverage from January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2026. Payment arrangements should be made with the clerk of Ball Bluff Township (fiduciary agent of the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department), 68368 198th Ave, Box B, Jacobson, MN 55752.
- 3. The Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department's obligation to provide fire protection service and emergency medical response shall be subject to the following:
 - a. If road and weather conditions at the time of the call are such that the fire/medical run cannot be made with reasonable safety to men and equipment, and the decision of the Fire Chief or his Assistant or Captains in charge shall be final in such matter, no obligation arises under this agreement on the part of the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department to answer such call.
 - b. In the event that a sufficient amount of the fire fighting/medical equipment and number of volunteer firemen, or both, are committed at the time of which another fire call comes in from the dispatcher of Aitkin County, in the sole judgment of the Fire Chief, his Assistant or Captains, to fighting pre-existing fires or attending pre-existing medical emergencies, so as to render the available equipment and manpower inadequate to answer a fire or medical call from the dispatcher of Aitkin County, no obligation shall arise under this agreement to answer such call. A pre-existing fire/medical emergency for the purposes of this agreement shall be a fire/medical emergency to which the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department is called previous to receiving the call from the dispatcher of Aitkin County and which fire is still being fought or medical emergency is still being attended to by the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department at the time the call from the dispatcher of Aitkin County is received.

- c. In the event a fire call is answered by the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department, but before the fire in question is extinguished, the fire fighting equipment or volunteer firemen, or both are needed to fight another fire in the Jacobson Fire Departments fire district to protect property in the Jacobson Fire Departments fire district from a fire, the Chief or his Assistant Chief or Captains without liability therefore to any person or to the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department or Township of Ball Bluff under this agreement, may in their judgment recall the fire equipment and firemen to another emergency for the purpose of fighting the fire in the fire district. The judgment of the Fire Chief, Assistant Chief or Captains shall be final and no person or party shall have recourse against the Townships or fire department for any damages or losses resulting from such action or decision.
- d. The first Responder's protocols for medical response units receiving medical direction from Med-1 Ambulance Service Inc., Minnesota Emergency Medical Services Regulatory Board, Minnesota Statutes 144E.27 subd. 5: The 1st responders from the Jacobson area and of the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department responds in the geographical are licensed to Med-1 Inc. and their mutual aid area.
- 4. The parties acknowledge the fact that the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department may enter into similar contracts with other townships, and acknowledge that the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department has entered into mutual aid contracts with other Fire Departments in other municipalities, and that a fire call under any such contract preceding a call in the Township could be a valid and reasonable basis for the decision of the Fire Chief, Assistant Chief or Captains in refusing to answer a fire call in the Township.
- 5. Because the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department has heretofore entered into mutual assistance fire fighting agreements with other municipalities possessing fire fighting equipment and firemen, which equipment and firemen could be called by the Chief, Assistant Chief or Captains to a fire in the Township, the Township agrees to pay such additional cost as may be incurred thereby if the sole judgment of the Chief, or his Assistant Chief or Captains, such additional fire fighting equipment and firemen are needed to fight a fire in the Township and are in fact called to such fire by the Chief, or his Assistant Chief or Captains.
- 6. Ball Bluff Township shall appoint one person from its board to sit on the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department Budget Committee to assist in preparing the following year's fire department budget and attend their monthly fire department meetings.
- 7. Townships contracted with the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department is invited to send representatives to the Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department meetings and Ball Bluff Township meetings. The Jacobson Volunteer Fire Department business meeting is held the first Thursday of each month. The Township of Ball Bluff meets the second Tuesday of each month.

Earned Sick and Safe Time (ESST) Policy

1. Purpose and Scope

This policy ensures compliance with Minnesota Statutes §§ 181.9445–181.9448 regarding earned sick and safe time (ESST). The employer already provides leave banks (PTO, Personal Leave, and Extended Sick Leave) that meet or exceed the minimum ESST standards. Accordingly, employees may use these existing leave banks for any purpose permitted under the ESST law.

This policy applies to all eligible employees who work at least 80 hours in a year in Minnesota, including part-time and temporary employees.

This policy does not apply to volunteers, independent contractors, or elected officials.

For purposes of this ESST policy, a "year" is defined as a calendar year.

2. Accrual of Earned Sick and Safe Time

- Employees accrue a minimum of **one hour of ESST for every 30 hours worked**, up to at least **48 hours per year**, unless the employer provides a more generous amount.
- Employees may carry over accrued but unused ESST into the following year, up to 80 hours.
- Accrual begins on the employee's first day of employment. ESST may be used as it is accrued.
- Exempt employees are assumed to work 40 hours per week unless their normal workweek is less.
- ESST is paid at the employee's base rate of pay, as defined by law.

3. Permitted Uses of ESST

Employees may use ESST for the following purposes:

Eligible use.

An employee may use accrued earned sick and safe time for:

(1) an employee's:

- (i) mental or physical illness, injury, or other health condition;
- (ii) need for medical diagnosis, care, or treatment of a mental or physical illness, injury, or health condition;

- (iii) need for preventive medical or health care; or
- (iv) need to make arrangements for or attend funeral services or a memorial, or address financial or legal matters that arise after the death of a family member;

(2) care of a family member:

- (i) with a mental or physical illness, injury, or other health condition;
- (ii) who needs medical diagnosis, care, or treatment of a mental or physical illness, injury, or other health condition; or
- (iii) who needs preventive medical or health care;
- (3) absence due to domestic abuse, sexual assault, or stalking of the employee or employee's family member, provided the absence is to:
- (i) seek medical attention related to physical or psychological injury or disability caused by domestic abuse, sexual assault, or stalking;
- (ii) obtain services from a victim services organization;
- (iii) obtain psychological or other counseling;
- (iv) seek relocation or take steps to secure an existing home due to domestic abuse, sexual assault, or stalking; or
- (v) seek legal advice or take legal action, including preparing for or participating in any civil or criminal legal proceeding related to or resulting from domestic abuse, sexual assault, or stalking;
- (4) closure of the employee's place of business due to weather or other public emergency or an employee's need to care for a family member whose school or place of care has been closed due to weather or other public emergency;
- (5) the employee's inability to work or telework because the employee is: (i) prohibited from working by the employer due to health concerns related to the potential transmission of a communicable illness related to a public emergency; or (ii) seeking or awaiting the results of a diagnostic test for, or a medical diagnosis of, a communicable disease related to a public emergency and such employee has been exposed to a communicable disease or the employee's employer has requested a test or diagnosis; and
- (6) when it has been determined by the health authorities having jurisdiction or by a health care professional that the presence of the employee or family member of the employee in the community would jeopardize the health of others because of the exposure of the employee or family member of the employee to a communicable disease, whether or not the employee or family member has actually contracted the communicable disease.

"Family member" includes a wide range of relationships defined in Minn. Stat. § 181.9445, including spouses, children, parents, grandparents, siblings, in-laws, designated individuals, and those with close associations equivalent to family.

4. Notice and Documentation

- If the need for leave is **foreseeable**, employees must provide up to **seven days'** advance notice when possible.
- If the need is **unforeseeable**, employees must provide notice **as soon as practicable**.
- If leave lasts more than two consecutive scheduled workdays (effective 1/1/2026), the employer may require **reasonable documentation** as permitted under the law.
- Employees may provide written statements; notarization is not required.
- Employees may, but are not required to find a replacement to cover their shift in order to use ESST.
- ESST may not be used on an employee's scheduled day off.

5. Increments of Use and Pay

- ESST may be used in increments consistent with the employer's payroll system.
- ESST is paid at the employee's base rate and does not include shift differential, overtime, FTO pay, or other pay premiums.
- The employer will maintain the employee's group insurance coverage during ESST usage as if the employee were working, provided the employee continues their share of premium contributions.

6. Protections and Retaliation Prohibited

• Employees are protected from discharge, discipline, or retaliation for exercising rights under ESST law.

7. Notice and Recordkeeping

- The employer will provide employees with a **written notice** of their ESST rights upon hire and through postings in the workplace or electronic systems.
- Each pay period, employees will receive a pay stub showing:

- Total leave bank hours accrued and available
- Total leave bank hours used during the pay period
- To ensure compliance in the event of an audit, the employer will document through internal payroll and leave records that at least 48 hours of qualifying ESST have been provided and protected annually through the employer's PTO, Personal Leave, and/or Extended Sick Leave banks. If fewer than 48 hours are used in a calendar year, unused hours will be carried over to the next year, up to a maximum of 80 hours, consistent with statutory requirements.
- The employer will retain ESST records in accordance with payroll retention requirements.

8. Confidentiality

All information related to an employee's use of ESST, including health or safety information, is **confidential** and may not be disclosed except as required by law or authorized by the employee.

9. Separation, Rehire, and Successorship

- Unused ESST is **not paid out** upon separation from employment, including layoff, voluntary resignation, retirement, or termination.
- If an employee is rehired within 180 days, previously accrued and unused ESST will be reinstated.

10. Interaction with Existing Leave Banks

Because the employer provides **PTO**, **Personal Leave**, **and Extended Sick Leave** that meet or exceed statutory requirements, these banks satisfy the minimum ESST obligations. No separate ESST bank is maintained. Employees may use these existing leave types for ESST-eligible reasons.

11. Additional Provisions

- ESST runs concurrent with FMLA, Minnesota Parental Leave Act, Paid Family and Medical Leave (PFML), and any other applicable leaves.
- Employees may not donate unused sick and safe time to other employees.
- Weather event exceptions apply as negotiated with licensed peace officers, dispatchers, correctional officers, and public employees holding a commercial

driver's license in the interest of public safety. Refer to the applicable collective bargaining agreement.

- Probationary periods will be extended by the length of any ESST taken, unless prohibited by contract or law.
- Employees are entitled to job reinstatement and continued accrual of seniority.

Family & Medical Leave (FMLA) Policy

Effective Date: January 1, 2026

1. Purpose

This policy implements the federal Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) as codified at 29 U.S.C. § 2601 et seq. The purpose of the FMLA is to enable eligible employees to take unpaid, job-protected leave for specified family and medical reasons, while maintaining health benefits during the leave period. This policy explains how employees may request and use FMLA leave, how the employer calculates leave entitlement under a "rolling 12-month period measured backward" method, and the rights and responsibilities of both employees and the employer.

2. Eligibility

To be eligible for FMLA leave under this policy, an employee must meet all of the following criteria:

- a. The employee has been employed by Aitkin County for at least 12 months (which need not be consecutive).
- b. The employee has worked at least 1,250 hours during the 12-month period immediately preceding the date the leave begins.
- c. The employee works at a location where Aitkin County employs 50 or more employees within 75 miles of that worksite.

3. Qualifying Reasons for FMLA Leave

Eligible employees may take FMLA leave for any of the following reasons:

- a. The birth of a child and to bond with the newborn child within 12 months of the birth.
- b. The placement of a child for adoption or foster care and to bond with that child within 12 months of the placement.
- c. To care for the employee's spouse, son, daughter, or parent who has a serious health condition.
- d. The employee's own serious health condition that renders the employee unable to perform the essential functions of his/her job.
- e. Qualifying exigencies arising from the fact that the employee's spouse, son, daughter, or parent is a covered military member on active duty (or has been notified of an impending call or order to active duty).
- f. Up to 26 workweeks of leave during a single 12-month period to care for a covered service member with a serious injury or illness.

4. Amount of Leave and the Rolling 12-Month Measurement Method

- a. Eligible employees are entitled to a total of 12 workweeks of FMLA leave during any 12-month period (or up to 26 workweeks for the service-member caregiver leave described above).
- b. Aitkin County uses a **rolling 12-month period measured backward** from the date an employee uses any FMLA leave. Each time an employee requests leave, Aitkin County will look back from the date the leave would commence and count the amount of FMLA leave the employee has used during the immediately preceding 12 months. The amount remaining (if any) of the 12-week (or 26-week) entitlement is the amount the employee may use.
- c. Once the employee either exhausts the 12 weeks (or 26 weeks) or reaches the end of the rolling 12-month look-back period, any further leave qualifies only once another 12-month period has passed so that leave in the past 12 months falls outside the look-back window.

5. Application for Leave and Notice Requirements

- a. Employees seeking FMLA leave for a foreseeable condition (such as planned birth/adoption or planned medical treatment) must provide at least 30 days' advance notice, or as soon as practicable when the leave is unforeseeable.
- b. Employees must follow Aitkin County's regular call-in procedures when they need to take FMLA leave unexpectedly.
- c. Aitkin County may require employees to provide sufficient information to determine whether the leave qualifies under FMLA, including medical certification, and must notify the employee whether the leave will be designated as FMLA within 5 business days of receiving sufficient information.
- D. FMLA runs concurrent with accrued PTO, Personal Leave, Extended Sick Leave, ESST, Minnesota Parental Leave Act, Paid Family and Medical Leave (PFML), and any other applicable leaves.

6. Intermittent or Reduced Schedule Leave

- a. FMLA leave may be taken intermittently or on a reduced-schedule basis when medically necessary for the serious health condition of the employee or a covered family member.
- b. FMLA leave may not be taken intermittently for the birth/adoption/foster placement of a child, unless beneficial for business continuity purposes as determined by the department head.
- b. When leave is taken intermittently or on a reduced schedule, the actual time off will be counted toward the 12-week (or 26-week) entitlement under the rolling 12-month period as described in Section 4.

7. Use of Paid Leave

- a. Aitkin County requires employees to substitute accrued paid leave (such as PTO, Personal Leave, or extended sick leave) for unpaid FMLA leave to the extent permitted by County policy and applicable law. Such paid leave will run concurrently with FMLA leave and count toward the 12-week (or 26-week) entitlement.
- b. When an employee has accrued paid leave but chooses not to use it (for example, if state PFML allows accrued time use to be voluntary), any part of the FMLA leave not covered by paid leave will be unpaid.

8. Maintenance of Health Benefits & Job Restoration

- a. During FMLA leave, Aitkin County will maintain the employee's group health insurance coverage on the same terms as if the employee had remained actively employed. The employee is responsible for his/her portion of insurance premiums.
- b. Before returning to work, employees on leave for their own serious health condition must submit a Report of Workability (ROW) from their healthcare provider and work with Human Resources to review and clear any work restrictions.
- c. Upon return from FMLA leave, the employee will be restored to the same position held prior to the leave, or to an equivalent position with equivalent pay, benefits, and other terms and conditions of employment.
- d. Examples of equivalent position: similar job duties, similar status, same pay, same benefits, similar shift and location, subject to legitimate business needs unrelated to taking FMLA leave.

9. Failure to Return From Leave

If the employee fails to return from FMLA leave after the period of leave expires (other than for a reason protected by the FMLA, or because the employee is unable to return due to a serious health condition or other protected reason), then Aitkin County may require reimbursement of health-insurance premiums it paid on the employee's behalf during the leave.

10. Recordkeeping and Confidentiality

Aitkin County will maintain records of FMLA leave usage for each eligible employee, including the dates and hours of leave taken, the reason for leave, and any required certification. These records will be treated as confidential and maintained separately from the employee's regular personnel file.

11. Compliance and Non-Retaliation

Aitkin County will comply with all provisions of the FMLA and applicable regulations. Employees will not be retaliated against for exercising rights under FMLA, for filing a complaint, or for cooperating in an investigation of a FMLA claim.

12. Policy Review and Amendments

Aitkin County reserves the right to amend or revise this policy at any time in order to comply with changes in federal, state, or local law, or for administrative purposes. Employees will be given notice of any changes.

Aitkin County Personnel Policy Addendum

Section: Leaves of Absence

Policy Title: Minnesota Paid Family and Medical Leave (PFML)

Effective Date: January 1, 2026

I. Purpose

To provide guidance on employee rights and employer responsibilities under the Minnesota Paid Family and Medical Leave (PFML) Act, effective January 1, 2026, as established by Minn. Stat. Chapter 268B.

II. Policy Overview

Beginning January 1, 2026, all employees, <u>including elected officials</u>, who meet PFML eligibility criteria may apply for paid family or medical leave through the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED). PFML provides partial wage replacement and job protection for qualifying leave events.

III. Eligibility

Employees are eligible for PFML if they:

- Worked in Minnesota at least 50% of the prior year or live in Minnesota; and
- Earned at least 5.3% of the statewide average annual wage in the previous year (approx. \$3,700 in 2024).

Federal employees and certain hospitality-industry seasonal workers are excluded. Employees must be employed with Aitkin County for at least 90 days to be eligible for job reinstatement protections.

IV. Leave Entitlement

PFML provides:

- Up to 12 weeks of medical leave for the employee's own serious health condition,
 and
- Up to **12 weeks** of **family leave** for qualifying reasons (bonding, caregiving, safety, active duty-related).

Maximum combined leave: 20 weeks per benefit year. Leave may be taken continuously or intermittently (minimum increment: .001 hours, unless indicated otherwise by departmental recordkeeping systems in the Sheriff's office and/or Highway department).

Intermittent Leave under PFML

Employees may take scheduled intermittent Paid Family and Medical Leave (PFML) when approved by the state. Intermittent PFML benefits are prorated, meaning the benefit payment will reflect only the portion of time the employee is actually on leave.

Intermittent PFML leave is limited to a maximum of 480 hours per calendar year (equivalent to 12 weeks of full-time leave). Any additional PFML leave beyond 480 hours must be taken as continuous leave, if eligible.

Example: An employee approved for intermittent PFML may take leave in partial-day or partial-week increments, such as one day per week to attend medical appointments. In this case, the employee would receive a partial benefit for each day taken, and the total time used will count toward the 480-hour annual cap.

V. Covered Family Members

Includes spouses/domestic partners, children, parents, siblings, grandparents, grandchildren, in-laws, and individuals with close personal relationships meeting PFML criteria.

VI. Interaction with Other Leaves

PFML will run concurrently with:

- FMLA (where applicable)
- Minnesota Parental Leave Act
- ESST
- Any other applicable leaves

Employees may elect to use earned paid time off (e.g., PTO, personal leave, comp time, sick leave, ESST) to supplement PFML benefits, but cannot be required to do so.

Coordination must not result in wage replacement exceeding the employee's regular wage.

VII. Application Process

Employees must:

- 1. Notify their supervisor or HR of the need for leave (30 days in advance if foreseeable).
- 2. Apply directly to DEED for PFML benefits (up to 60 days before the leave start date).
- 3. Submit any required documentation to DEED for eligibility certification.

The employer's designated PFML administrators (HR Director, HR Specialist, and Payroll Technician) will review and respond to DEED inquiries within 7 calendar days.

VIII. Premiums and Funding

PFML is funded by employer and employee payroll premiums, shared 50/50. Deductions will begin January 1, 2026. Contribution rates are set by the state and may be adjusted annually or as otherwise determined by the state.

IX. Seniority, Job Protection, and Continuation of Benefits

Upon return from PFML, employees are entitled to:

- Reinstatement to the same or equivalent position
- Continuation of group benefits during leave. Employees are responsible for coordinating their share of premium payments with Payroll prior to any planned leave. In situations where advance notice is not possible due to incapacity, the employee (or their representative) must contact Payroll to make payment arrangements as soon as practicable.
- Protection from retaliation or interference in exercising PFML rights
- Bargaining unit employees who are in an unpaid status through the employer shall continue to accrue seniority for up to thirty (30) calendar days during a leave of absence, unless otherwise provided in the collective bargaining agreement.
- Probationary periods will be extended by the length of any leave taken, unless such extension is prohibited by the collective bargaining agreement or law.

X. Notices and Documentation

By December 1, 2025, Aitkin County will provide all employees with the required PFML notice, including contribution information, DEED contact details, and rights under the statute. New employees will receive this notice within 30 days of hire. Employees will be asked to acknowledge receipt in writing.

XI. Administration and Updates

The State of MN in cooperation with the Human Resources Department is responsible for administering PFML compliance. This policy is subject to change based on state guidance or legislative updates. Questions should be directed to Human Resources.

ACCESS EASEMENT AGREEMENT

THIS RESIDENTIAL ROAD ACCESS EASEMENT AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made effective as of the date of the last signature below by and between the County of Aitkin, a political subdivision of the State of Minnesota ("Grantor"), and David L Hulbert and Doreen Hulbert, trustees under the David Hulbert Living Trust, dates August 27, 1988, Kevin H. Hulbert, Duane C. Hulbert, and Gary W. Hulbert (collectively referred to as the "Hulberts"), and the Minnesota Land Trust, a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Minnesota ("Land Trust"). The Hulberts and the Land Trust may be referred to collectively as the "Grantee."

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, Grantor is the owner of certain real property located in the County of Aitkin, State of Minnesota, and legally described on **Exhibit A** attached hereto and incorporated by this reference ("Burdened Property");

WHEREAS, the Land Trust is working with the Hulberts of the land that is adjacent to the Burdened Property, in the County of Aitkin, State of Minnesota and legally described on **Exhibit B** attached hereto and incorporated by this reference ("Benefitted Property"), to place a perpetual conservation easement over the Benefitted Property;

WHEREAS, the Land Trust intends to accept the conservation easement from the Hulberts over the Benefitted Property and, as holder of a perpetual conservation easement over the Benefitted Property, requires perpetual legal rights of ingress and egress to the Benefitted Property;

WHEREAS, Grantor desires to convey to the Grantee such legal rights of ingress and egress to the Benefitted Property over the Burdened Property within and across the area legally described on **Exhibit C** and depicted on **Exhibit D**, which are both attached hereto and incorporated by this reference ("Easement Area");

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Grant of Access Easement. Grantor hereby conveys and warrants to the Grantee a nonexclusive, perpetual access easement to the Benefitted Property over and across the Burdened Property within the Easement Area. The Easement will be perpetual and will be appurtenant to and benefit the Hulberts access to and the Land Trust's conservation easement interest in the Benefitted Property.
- 2. Maintenance of Access Easement. The Hulberts shall be permitted to clear vegetation to create and make such improvements necessary to establish a driveway within the Easement Area for that section of the Easement Area that does not run along Snake River Campground Road, or that otherwise does not already contain an established road or driveway. Once established, the Hulberts are responsible for the maintenance, repair, or replace any of the sections of driveway which they created within the Easement Area. The Hulberts will have no obligation to maintain, repair, or replace any section of Snake River Campground Road. The Land Trust will have no obligation under this Agreement to maintain, repair, or replace any existing or constructed road or driveway associated with the Access Easement, or any other improvement or condition within the Easement Area.
- 3. No Interference. Grantor shall not interfere with or obstruct the Grantee's use of the Easement.
- 4. Easement Benefit. The terms of this Agreement will be binding upon the Grantor and will be for the benefit of the Grantee and its respective permittees, licensees, successors in interest, and assigns.
- 5. Easement Runs with the Land. The Easement will run with the land and will bind the parties hereto and their successors in interest and assigns and their respective property interests.
- 6. Non-merger. Common ownership of the Burdened Property and the Benefitted Property, or any portions thereof, will not cause the Easement or this Agreement to be extinguished by operation of merger.
- 7. Amendment. This Agreement cannot be amended or terminated except by an agreement in writing signed by both the Grantor and the Grantee, or their successors in interest.

- 8. Construction. This Agreement, including all questions concerning the construction, validity, and interpretation of this Agreement and all exhibits hereto will be governed under the laws of the State of Minnesota.
- 9. Aitkin County manages County owned and tax-forfeited lands to produce direct and indirect revenue for the taxing districts. This management includes the harvesting and extraction of timber, gravel, minerals, and other resources. The issuing and use of this Easement shall not adversely affect the management and harvesting of timber and other resources on County owned and tax forfeited land. If for any reason, including township or county road construction or reconstruction, the easement needs to be relocated, the county and township will not be responsible for any relocation cost.
- 10. Land affected by this Easement may be sold or leased for any legal purpose, but such sale or lease shall be subject to this Easement and excepted from the conveyance or lease while such Easement remains in force.
- 11. Failure to use the Easement described in this document for the purpose for which this Easement is granted for a period of five years, shall result in the cancellation of this Easement and any rights granted to the grantee by this Easement shall cease to exist and shall revert to the grantor.
- 12. All Federal, State, and local laws, ordinance rules, and regulations regarding wetlands, construction of roads, placement of fill material, and disposal of excavated material shall be followed and are the responsibility of the grantee.
- 13. Should this Easement be terminated based on the provision outlined in paragraph 11, the grantee shall promptly remove all personal property and restore said lands to proper condition at no cost to the grantor. If the grantee fails to do so within 60 days of termination, the grantor shall have the right to remove said personal property and restore said land in which event the grantee shall promptly reimburse the grantor for all costs incurred plus 15%.
- 14. Any land survey markers or monuments, disturbed, moved or destroyed during the construction or maintenance of this Easement area shall be replaced and restored at the expense of the Hulberts. If not replaced or restored by the Hulberts, the County may restore said monument, and the Hulberts shall be responsible for all costs of said replacement and restoration plus 15%.
- 15. Signatures. This Agreement may be completed with the signatures of the parties hereto executed and notarized on separate pages which when attached to this document will constitute one complete document.

Local Showcases

Aitkin County Fair

This year at the Aitkin County Fair, the 4-H program had many youth participate. In total, 4-H'ers had almost 1,300 entries in both livestock projects and general projects. There were 128 youth that participated and 6 clubs that participated in the showcase. New additions from 2024 that continued into 2025 included an exhibitor connection night in which youth and families were invited to play games, meet fairboard members and superintendents, and review the rules of the grounds. A general project celebration at the Windy River Stage was held in which all youth that received Grand, Reserve, and Blue champion awards were recognized. The costume classes for youth exhibiting livestock were an exciting continuation. Thank you to Commissioner Travis

Aitkin County 4-H Dog Show

This year at the Aitkin County 4-H Dog Show, we had 8 youth participate. Of the 8 youth, one youth was a Cloverbud. Cloverbuds in the 4-H program are youth in grades K-2 and the focus of Cloverbuds is learning their interests and participation to start to gain knowledge and skills. Competition isn't introduced to these youth until grade 3 with competition increasing at grade 6 with additional opportunities to be eligible for some state events and programs. The Aitkin County 4-H Dog Show held 4 different classes: agility, obedience, showmanship, and rally.

Regional Project Bowl Competition

Two teams of youth decided to adventure into the world of Project Bowl. Each project area that a team wishes to compete in is given specific resources to study from, quizzed on their knowledge of the 4-H project area, and compete in a double elimination bracket against other teams. Aitkin's teams, the Lippity Lops (rabbit) & Potatoes Prodigies (horse), competed at the regional competition in Bemidji in early April. The Lippity Lops were the Grand Champions of the Junior Rabbit Division while Potato's Protegies were the Reserve Champions of the Junior Horse Division and both advanced to the State Competition.



Northeast Livestock Show

The Northeast Livestock Show is an additional opportunity for youth in the Northeast Region to compete in the livestock project areas 4-H offers. To qualify to compete at the show, youth must have earned a blue ribbon with their animal at the county fair 4-H showcase. This year was the 90th annual show and 11 youth from Aitkin County 4-H participated with champions in the rabbit and poultry projects. Livestock projects represented by

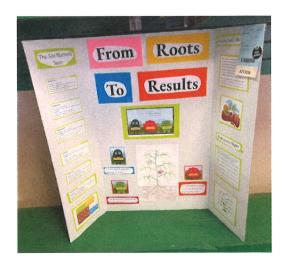

The County Commissioner Liaison serves as the official representative of the County Board of Commissioners to the Housing and Redevelopment Authority of Aitkin County (HRA). The position exists to facilitate effective communication, coordination, and policy alignment between the County Board and the HRA Board.

Scope of Role:

The liaison provides a direct channel for the exchange of information and perspectives between the two governing bodies. The liaison's role is advisory in nature and does not include administrative or supervisory authority over HRA operations, staff, or programs.

Duties and Responsibilities:

- 1. **Participation:** Attend meetings of the HRA Board and participate in discussions to remain informed of the Authority's activities, programs, and financial matters.
- 2. **Reporting:** Provide regular updates to the County Board regarding HRA initiatives, accomplishments, and issues of mutual concern.
- 3. **Communication of Priorities:** Convey County Board goals, policy directions, and strategic housing or redevelopment objectives to the HRA Board.
- 4. **Coordination:** Promote collaboration and consistency between County and HRA efforts to address local housing, community development, and economic revitalization needs.
- 5. **Advisory Function:** Offer input and guidance on matters of countywide significance while recognizing the HRA's statutory independence and operational authority.

Voting Status:

Unless formally appointed by the County Board of Commissioners as a member of the HRA Board in accordance with **Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.006**, the County Commissioner Liaison serves in a **non-voting advisory capacity**.

Selection and Term:

The County Board of Commissioners shall designate one of its members to serve as liaison to the HRA Board. The liaison shall be appointed by motion or resolution of the County Board at its annual organizational meeting or as otherwise determined by the Board. The liaison shall serve at the pleasure of the County Board, with the term customarily aligned to the calendar year or until a successor is appointed.

Proposed Changes to Roadway Designations

There are three systems of Roads Maintained by Aitkin County:

- 1. County State-Aid Highway (CSAH)
 - 382 miles
 - i. 250 miles paved
 - ii. 132 miles gravel-surfaced
 - Generally higher traffic
 - Secondary roads that connect other secondary roads and major highway corridors
- 2. County Roads (CR)
 - 135 miles
 - i. 27 miles paved
 - ii. 108 miles gravel-surfaced
 - Generally lower traffic.
 - Secondary roads that connect other secondary roads and major highway corridors
- 3. Unorganized Township Roads
 - 38 miles, all gravel-surfaced
 - Generally local, very low volume roads that are used primarily for local traffic
 - Often are dead-end roads

Change the Designation of CSAH and CR Routes

There are two main reasons for the proposal to change the designation of CSAH and CR routes at this time. First, in the coming years, CSAH 5 through the Kimberly area will be improved to a paved route with a sequence of projects in 2026 and 2028. When completed, the continuous improved route between CSAH 4 and TH 210 will consist of 3.1 miles of CR 53 and 4.7 miles of CSAH 5. For route continuity, CSAH 5 should follow the improved route to/from CSAH 4 rather than meandering through 6 miles of graveled surface road between CR 53 and State Highway 47. Upon the changed designation, CSAH 5 would be a continuous paved route between CSAH 4 and State Highway 210. The existing segment of CSAH 5 from CR 53 to TH 47 would become a county road. This change would result in a net reduction of 3.6 miles to our CSAH system

The second reason involves CR 51, which is a 4.9 mile segment of gravel surfaced road between TH 18 in Wealthwood and CSAH 28. It's likely that the first phase of construction to improve this segment to a paved road will be included in our 5-year Capital Road Improvement Plan within the next two years. If this route were to remain as a county

road designation, the two-phase, \$6 million project would require either an extended period of time to pay for it with local levy funds or a significant increase to the \$740,000 that we levy annually for county road improvements. Changing this route to a CSAH route and being able to utilize CSAH funding will allow the improvement of this segment to be completed sooner and at a lower cost to Aitkin County property owners. Because of it's location on the highway system in that area, it fits very well on the CSAH system. Changing this 4.9-mile route to a CSAH route, combined with the 3.6-mile reduction from CSAH 5 as outlined previously would result in a net 1.3-mile addition to our CSAH system.

Simply adding mileage to our CSAH system is not a feasible option, as state-aid rules require a process whereby the County Engineers Screening Board scrutinizes any mileage request. Being granted an additional 1.2 miles is extremely unlikely since Aitkin County already has a large CSAH system compared to the size of our CR system. Therefore, additional changes would be needed to achieve a zero net gain of CSAH mileage. The proposal to accomplish this with further changing the designation of CSAH 26, CR 75, and CR 81, is outlined as follows:

Change 15.8 miles from CSAH to CR:

- a. 5.7 miles of CSAH 5 to CR 55
- b. 1.0 mile of CSAH 5 to CR 50
- c. 9.1 miles of CSAH 26 to CR 51

Change 15.8 miles from CR to CSAH:

- a. 3.1 miles of CR 53 to CSAH 5
- b. 4.9 miles of CR 51 to CSAH 42
- c. 6.8 miles of CR 75 to CSAH 27
- d. 1.0 miles of CR 81 to CSAH 43

The attached map shows these changed designations. Note that the 4.2 mile segment of CSAH 34 from CSAH 2 to CR 75 would also be re-numbered to CSAH 27 for continuity.

Change the Designation of CR and Unorganized Township Routes

There are two unorganized township routes in Unorganized Townships 52-24 and 52-27 that carry significant volumes of thru-traffic and connect secondary roads and major highway corridors. Both of these routes need significant gravel road improvements that are difficult to complete with very limited unorganized township funds.

There are also two segments of CR 68 in Unorganized Townships 50-26 and 50-27 that are dead-end local routes and carry primarily local traffic. Both of these routes would

be more appropriately designated as unorganized township roads. Note that the middle portion of CR 68 from State Highway 169 to CSAH 29 would remain as a CR.

The proposed changes to the CR and Unorganized Township road systems are summarized as follows:

Change 4.0 miles from Unorganized Township to CR:

- a. 2 miles of 420th Avenue (Miller Road) from CR 67 to State Highway 200 in Unorganized Township 52-27 to CR 52
- b. 2 miles of 250th Avenue (Rabey road) from State Highway 200 to Itasca CR 448 in Unorganized Township 52-24 to CR 53

Change 3.2 miles from CR to Unorganized Township:

- a. 2 miles of CR 68 (540th Lane) from CSAH 29 to 410th Lane in Unorganized Township 50-27
- b. 1.2 miles of CR 68 (540th Lane) from US Hwy 169 to end of road in Unorganized Township 50-26

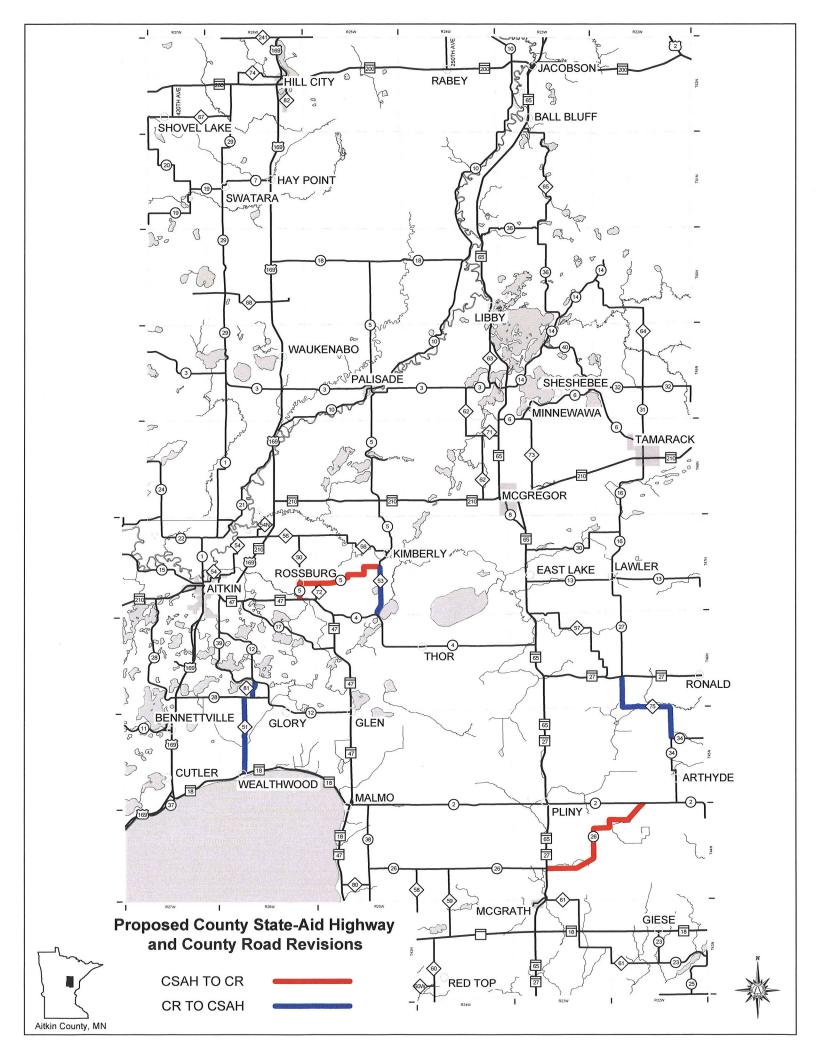
Addition of CR route

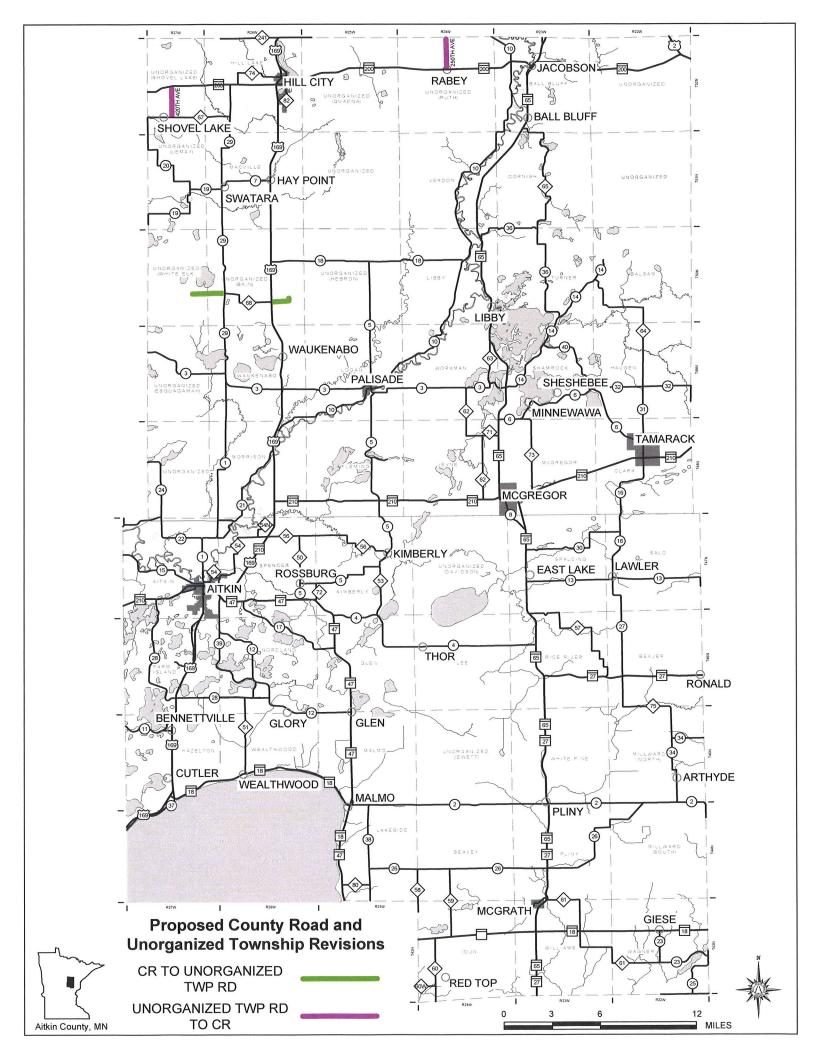
Access to our Gun Lake Pit includes an 0.6-mile segment of 439th Lane from 309th Place to CH 5. Much of this road has an extensive history dating back to 1988 of easements being granted, a cartway being established by Fleming Township, and recent court action to grant legal access to properties on the north side of Wilkins Lake. Ongoing maintenance of this road is a combination of work done by Aitkin County as a pit access road, with other private individuals also performing various maintenance activities. To clarify access to the Gun Lake Pit and to allow maintenance of this road by Aitkin County, designation of this 0.6 mile segment as a county road is being requested.

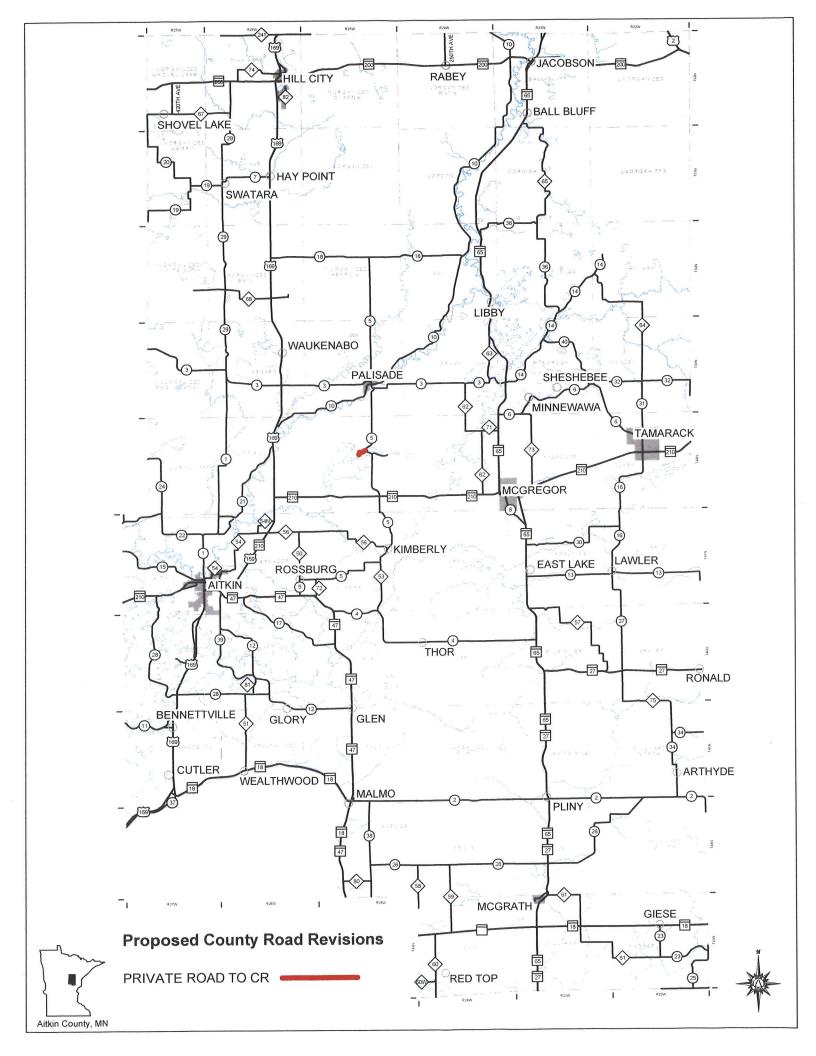

3rd Quarter Budget Update

One of the duties of the County Administrator is to "manage" the budget. I interpret "managing the budget" as (1) working with department heads and others to ensure that the budget is implemented as approved by the county board and (2) periodically updating the county board.

My intent is to give you a quarterly report that provides a high-level snapshot of revenue and expenditures measured against the budget in four charts. The attached four charts are all measured as percentages of the approved budget as of the end of September, or 75% through the year.

Chart 1 compares revenue and expenditure in the General Fund, Road and Bridge Fund, Health and Human Services Fund and total all county funds. These three funds encompass most of the county's financial activity and staff. The remaining columns represent the total of all county funds.

Overall, the General Fund is tracking well as measured against budget for both revenues and expenditures. Revenue is at 67%. This number does not include the 2nd half property tax payment or County Program Aid payment. Expenditures are at 68%, which is fine for this point in the year.

The Road and Bridge Fund is at 82% revenue and 91% expenditures. Although both are above 75% it is not a concern as those numbers are driven by the timing of the projects, payments, and reimbursements.

The HHS fund revenue is at 71% and expenditures are at 78%. Expenditures are tracking a little bit high and are explained below under Chart 4.

The total county revenue through September 30th is 83% of budget and the expenditures are at 84%. These numbers capture some unbudgeted activity such as the economic development loan fund, coronavirus relief fund, and the opioid settlement fund.

Chart 2 shows the revenue in the General Fund by budget department for funds with \$100,000 or more of budgeted revenue. Assessor is near 100% as most revenue is the township assessments which are fully collected. The jail and solid waste are underperforming. In the jail, most of the shortfall is accounted for by the lack of boarding revenue and the budgeted use of fund balance. Fund balance does not appear as a revenue, so it skews actual to budget comparisons. There is not concern in Solid Waste as the majority of revenue is from the property tax levy and the 2nd half payment has not been accounted for. Additionally, there is \$45,000 in fund balance included in the budget, which is not a revenue.

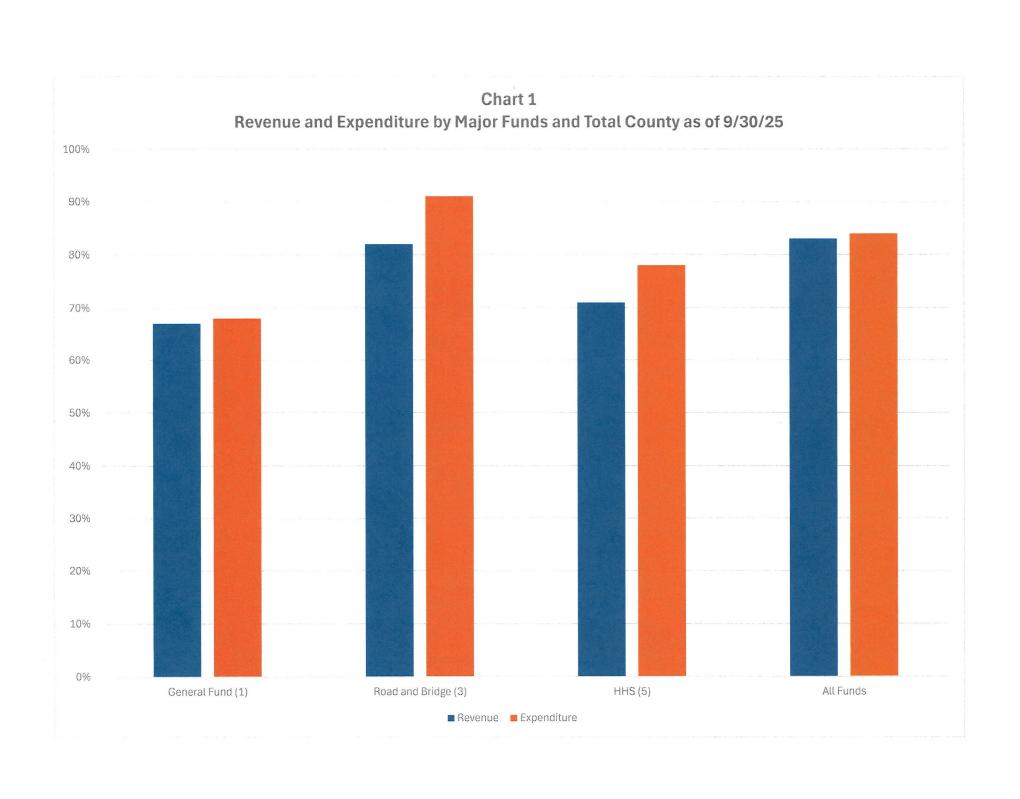
Chart 3 shows expenditures in the General Fund by operating departments over \$100,000. Most departments are tracking around 70%-75%. A few departments are spending well below budget.

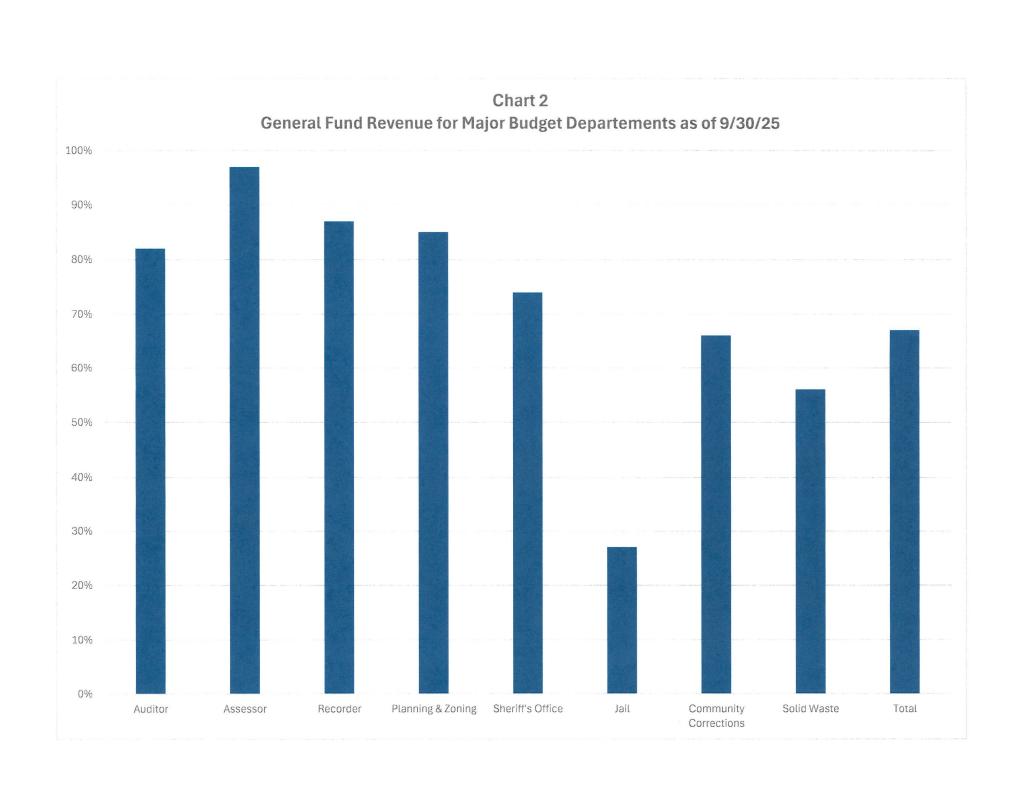
Administration is at 48% due to vacancy savings. Buildings shows as significantly under budget. The roof replacement costs of nearly \$370,000 will appear in the October activity. As Jim Bright noted in his update, the project came in under budget. The U of M Extension is at 48% because it does not show the 2nd half contract payment.

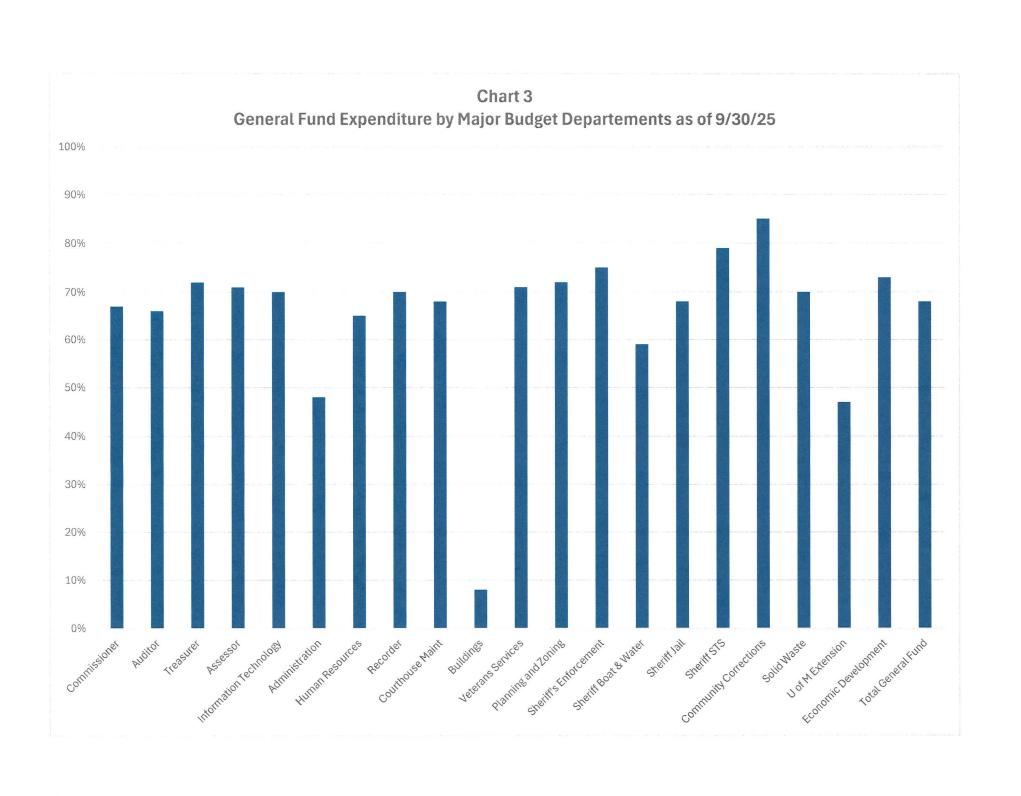
The one department that is trending significantly over budget is Community Corrections. This situation is the result of higher than budgeted detention costs and it is anticipated that this line item will be over budget for the year.

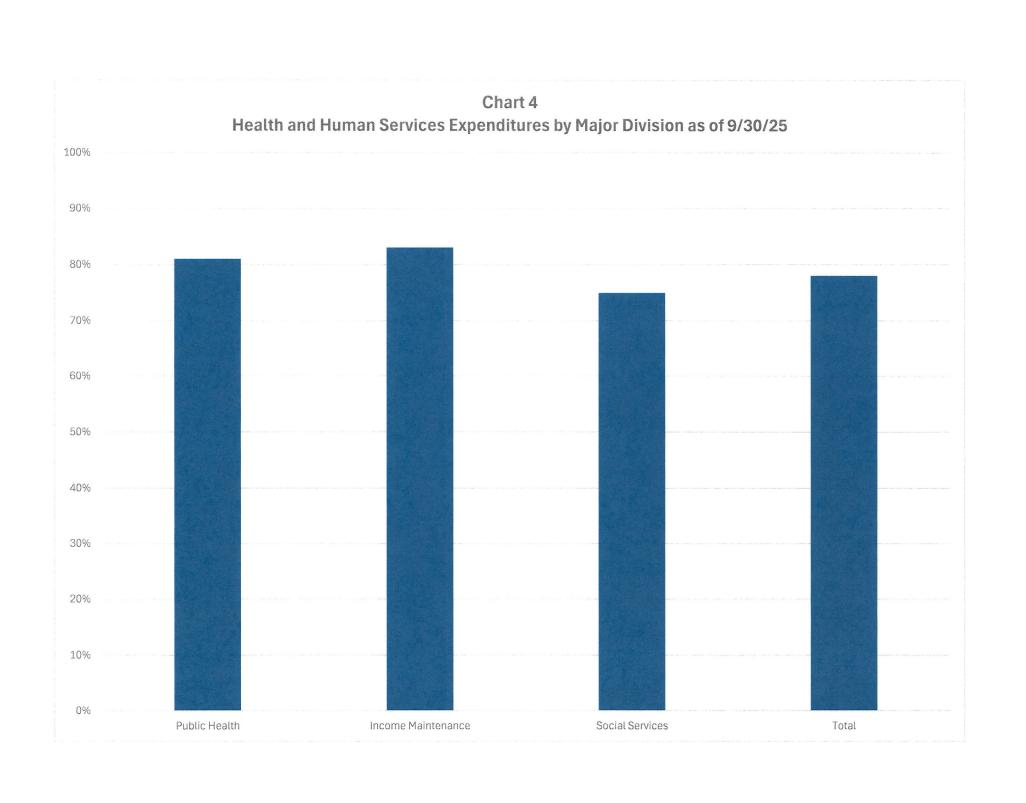
Total General Fund expenditures are at 68%.

Chart 4 shows a little more detail in the HHS fund by breaking out spending in the major program areas of Public Health, Income Maintenance and Social Services. The chart shows the spending trending high due to planned spending of reserves. These expenses include approximately \$270,000 in building related costs for the remodel project and about \$55,000 in technology costs. These costs are spread across the three program areas.

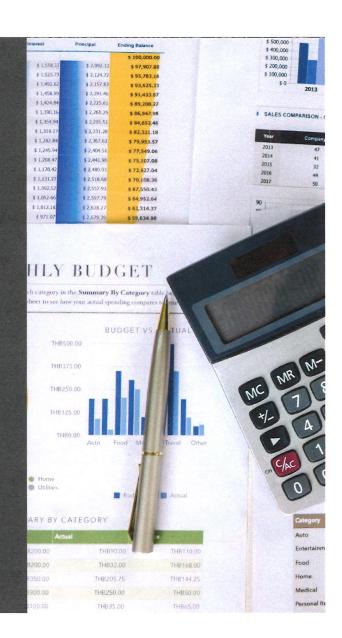

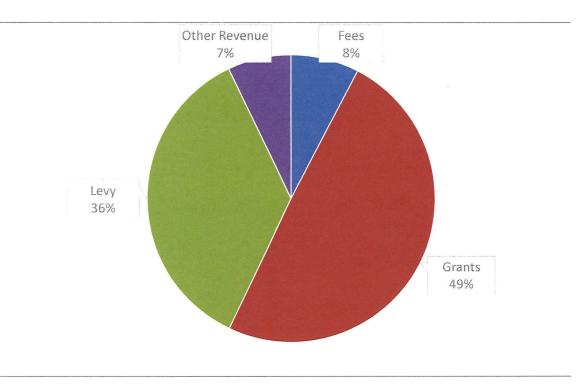

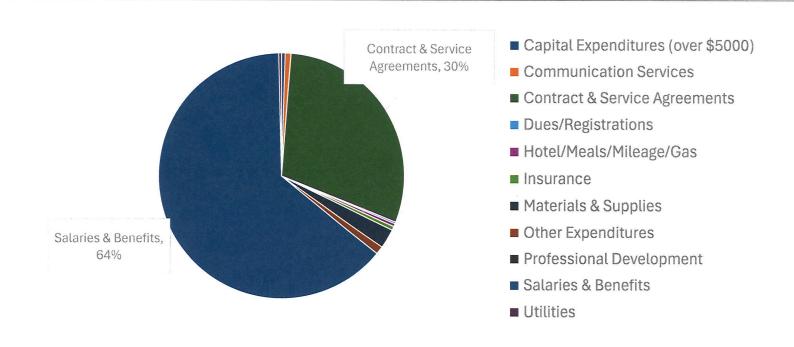

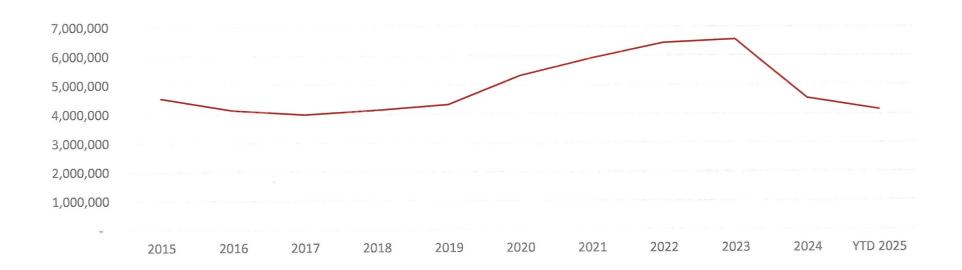
